Warehouse Forklift Training Programs Coquitlam - Warehouses can either be retail, industrial or commercial facilities, functioning from bulk product retailing to product distribution services. Regardless of the kind of warehouse, staff within warehouse settings should be well trained in safety measures related to material handling and storage, conveyor systems, loading docks, and forklifts and pallet jacks. Good housekeeping is important to an orderly and safe warehouse setting.

The loading dock system is often built into the warehouse at a height from the ground making it easy to move products coming in and moving out of the warehouse. Staff will likewise load and unload merchandise and materials from the elevated docks and ramps. Particular attention must be paid to safety practice during this stage. To avoid falls, install yellow striping along the edge of ramps and docks. Pay attention to the area around delivery trucks that are parked at the loading dock, particularly the area between dock and the truck. Be sure that while unloading, truck wheels are chocked.

To distribute products inside the facility, some warehouses make use of a conveyor system. These systems are designed with moving belts and wheels which may pose a pinch point danger. Keep body parts and hair far away from conveyors to avoid injury. Elevated conveyors pose a hazard to staff below if safety nets are absent. Employees ought to know how to stop conveyors in the event of emergency. Be aware of the location of emergency stop buttons and off switches. When servicing conveyors, tag out/lock out measures are mandatory.

Pallet jacks and forklifts are designed to move materials around the warehouse. Operators of forklifts are needed to take training and receive certification. Pallet jack operators do not need certification, but should be trained on the machinery. Training courses instruct operators in the correct ways for lifting things and moving them to their assigned location. Neither pallet jacks nor forklifts should ever be used to transport or lift employees.

To allow for enough room for equipment and individuals to pass, rack systems and storage shelving help to create an efficient and orderly work space, especially if they are properly braced. Careful and slow placement of goods is required to avoid accidents caused by products falling off the facing aisle. Aisles must be kept clear by storing products flat and within the shelving units. Pallets are used for stacking products. They must be in good condition, and palletized products must be baled or shrink-wrapped, whenever possible.

Personal protective equipment (or also known as PPE) must be worn, as appropriate, to protect employees' heads, limbs, hands and feet. Hard hats or bump caps, steel-toed shoes and gloves are common PPE.

Slippery floors that are pocked with dents and pits can present significant hazards, making good housekeeping very essential. Warehouse floors and docks should be clear of dirt, debris and oil. The area must be kept clear of garbage, boxes and baling supplies.
